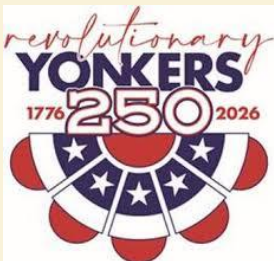

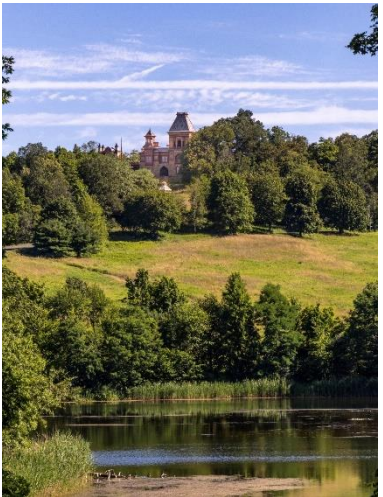

What’s Missing?
Olana State Historic Site | Now through October 31, 2025
Organized by The Olana Partnership

Olana is the most intact historic artist’s environment in the United States, encompassing the Main House and its extensive collections, an historic farm complex, and the 250-acre landscape designed by Frederic Church. Despite its remarkable state of preservation, several of Olana’s extant structures were removed years prior to Olana becoming a National Historic Landmark and New York State Historic Site. In these structures’ absence, stories of the people who built them and the functions they served have also been lost. Visible foundations and archaeological evidence survive for some of

these missing structures. In other cases, only photographs, maps, or oral histories bear witness to their past existence. These buildings may have vanished, but their stories remain embedded within Olana’s landscape. For *What’s Missing?*, The Olana Partnership commissioned artists **Ellen Harvey** and **Gabriela Salazar** to create site-specific outdoor artworks that respond to these missing pieces of Olana’s landscape history. *Image by: Peter Aaron/ OTTO*. **The Travelers and Excavations of Ancient Petra
Saturday, October 11 | 5:00 – 6:00 pm**

Nestled in the rose-red sandstone cliffs and surrounded by the deserts of what is today southern Jordan, the archaeological site of Petra is one of humanities greatest wonders. Hewn from canyon walls, the rock-cut city thrived for centuries as the capital of the ancient Nabataean people. Most often recognized by The Treasury, an enigmatic but stunning structure Frederic Church captured in his 1874 painting, *El Khasné, Petra*, the city sprawled for miles.

Join Professor Pearce Paul Creasman for a discussion of the ancient travelers who helped bring this enigmatic site to the contemporary world’s attention and an exploration of the recent archaeological work shaping an understanding of Petra’s history and impact. This onsite lecture takes place in the Frederic Church Center for Art & Landscape; refreshments to follow.

Guided Forest Bathing with Fru Molnar

WEBINAR – Botanical Exchanges: The Art of Emily Cole and Isabel Charlotte “Downie” Church

Tuesday, October 28 | 12:00 – 1:00pm

Emily Cole and Downie Church were both prolific painters of flora, finding inspiration in the meadows, orchards, and gardens of their Hudson Valley homes. As friends, neighbors, and fellow artists, Emily Cole and Downie Church continued the legacy of artistic mentorship begun by their artist fathers, Thomas Cole (1801-1848) and Frederic Edwin Church (1826-1900). This discussion will explore how Emily Cole’s and Downie Church’s artistic practices—largely characterized by the close observation of the natural world, specifically its flora—reflect personal expression, gendered expectations, and the professional artistic networks and trends of the late 19th century

Join Allegra Davis (former Associate Curator, The Olana Partnership; M.A. candidate in the History of Art & Architecture, Boston University) and Amanda Malmstrom (Associate Curator, Thomas Cole National Historic Site) for a conversation on 19th-century flower painting with focus on the artwork of Emily Cole (1843–1913) and Isabel Charlotte “Downie” Church (1871–1935).

Edgewater was built for John R. Livingston as a present to his daughter Margaretta on the occasion of her marriage to Captain Rawlins Lowndes Brown of Charleston, South Carolina. In 1853, Edgewater was purchased

by Robert Donaldson, a North Carolina native who moved to New York to pursue a career in business. Donaldson enlarged the house the following year with an octagonal library after designs by Alexander Jackson Davis.

There are two tour times to choose from, 11 a.m. or 1 p.m. Each includes a tour of the interior of the home, with time to explore the expansive ornamental grounds. Parking is outside of the gates with an approximately one quarter mile walk to the house. Shuttle transportation is available.
